Tournament action begins on Friday at Noon with No. 1 Monroe CC taking on No. 4 Alfred State in an opening round game followed by No. 2 Genesee taking on No. 4 Mercyhurst North East at 4 p.m. All games of the tournament are scheduled for nine innings.
